Concurrent Sessions

Academic Integrity and AI: Tiered Policy Approaches that Work

- Sarah Johnson, Madison College

Navigating generative AI policy is tough. Faculty need the flexibility to incorporate or limit AI use according to their content and learning outcomes, but students need clear and consistent guidance from their institution. This presentation will introduce a three-tiered policy approach that allows institutions to craft clear policy language that focuses on alignment of principles rather than exact duplication of policy detail across programs.

Active Learning + AI = An Interesting Experiment at the University of Pennsylvania's Graduate School of Education

- Rob Nelson, University of Pennsylvania

Many campuses have been encouraging active learning approaches to teaching, often with mixed results because students (and some teachers) resist the change in expectations and class dynamics. What happens when you add a large language model (LLM) to this approach with the goal of supporting student's work outside of class? This session will present an experiment at the University of Pennsylvania in the course *History of Higher Education in the US* taught in the Fall '25 term and organized around Structured, Active, In-class Learning (SAIL). Participants will have a chance to see JeepyTA, an LLM-based learning tool developed as a research project at the Penn Center for Learning Analytics, and hear from participants about how the experiment went.

Al Literacy: Action Planning for Campus Success

- Meg Mittelstadt, University of Georgia

As institutions navigate the challenges and opportunities of generative AI, many have established campus-wide AI committees tasked with shaping campus strategy, crafting policies, and/or fostering AI literacy within their communities. This workshop introduces a campus planning framework grounded in

Kotter's eight-step change model, tailored to support campus-wide AI literacy initiatives. The framework can guide AI committees in evaluating their mission, structure, and activities or in devising updated strategies to address emerging needs. Participants will explore strategies to create a sense of urgency regarding AI literacy, build a guiding coalition, and craft a clear vision for change. Emphasis will be placed on engaging stakeholders, removing barriers, and achieving early successes that drive long-term institutional transformation. By leveraging this structured approach, institutions can integrate AI literacy into their educational framework, ensuring meaningful and sustainable change across campus.

Breaking the Iron Triangle: A Case Study

- Thomas Cavanagh, University of Central Florida

Conventional wisdom holds that an <u>iron triangle of quality, cost, and access</u> exists within higher education. The typical understanding is that institutions are unable to positively impact any one of the bars of the triangle without negatively impacting one or both of the others. For example, increasing quality will result in reduced access and increased cost. Or, increasing access will result in reduced quality. However, such assumptions are based on traditional institutional strategies and methods. Forward-thinking colleges and universities are applying innovative digital technologies that have the ability to "break" the iron triangle and result in positive outcomes across all three dimensions of quality, cost, and access. This session will describe how the University of Central Florida is applying digital strategies to overcome the constraints of the iron triangle and positively impact students across all three dimensions.

Creating and Adapting Assignments for AI Integration

- Chuck Hodges, Georgia Southern University

As artificial intelligence becomes increasingly prevalent in professional and academic settings, educators face the challenge of preparing students to work alongside AI tools effectively. This session focuses on designing assignments that intentionally incorporate AI use, fostering students' skills in leveraging these powerful tools while maintaining academic integrity.

How Do I Know the Students are Learning?: Evaluating the Impact of AI on Learning Outcomes

- Bethany Miller, Macalester College

One of the many concerns about AI is the impact on student learning. AI doesn't necessarily prevent students from learning, and it also doesn't mean that students are learning. How do we evaluate whether students are learning when AI is available? This session will focus on ways to think about the inclusion of AI in the classroom and its impact on student learning.

Infusing Data-informed #Gen-AI Use Cases Into College Coursework With a Prompt-A-Thon!

- Jeanne Beatrix Law, Kennesaw State University

In their March 2024 book, *Generative AI and Higher Education*ⁱ, Chan and Colloton discuss infusing curricula with Gen-AI to assess and enhance student success. While universities across diverse institutional and academic contexts are engaging in these conversations, they sometimes leave out faculty training as a foundation for infusing gen-AI in specific educational use cases. A key part of professional development work is training faculty to engage with gen-AI in their specific disciplines to show them how to deploy their own pedagogies and field-specific learning theories while also exploring innovations like collaborative learning to align student learning to measurable outcomes. In her talk today, Dr. Jeanne Law will walk faculty through explorations of their own comfort zones with gen-AI infusions, help them think about best practices pedagogies, and finally lead them in a Prompt-A-Thon based on KSU's tested Rhetorical Prompt Engineering Method to help them elicit ethical and useful outputs for assignment and curriculum design.

Meeting the Challenge: Three Principles for Generating an Al-Responsive Approach to Post-Secondary Education

- Kyle Jensen, Arizona State University

Faculty and administrators often wonder which principles should guide their use of generative AI technologies. They recognize the importance of developing common goals that improve the university as a whole. But in the absence of a coherent approach to principled innovation, units work at cross purposes, which results in operational inefficiencies and frustrating redundancies. This seminar presents three key principles for implementing an AI-responsive approach to postsecondary education. The goal is to present a principle-driven, coherent plan that allows colleagues, first, to imagine cross-disciplinary projects that advance the university's mission and, second, to allow different units the freedom to be creative under a coherent educational plan. Each principle discussed in the session will come with a specific example or case study that draws into clear relief why the principle matters and how it may be adapted to maximize benefits.

Using AI to Promote Career-Integrated Learning Resources

- Peter Shea, Middlesex Community College in Massachusetts

Traditional academic pathways often delay essential career preparation, a gap that AI can bridge by enabling real-time, personalized learning experiences. This session will introduce a new model where AI is central in creating more resources for career-focused education, offering tools like simulations for workplace competencies and AI-driven tutoring. Presenter Peter Shea will discuss how AI facilitates a seamless integration of academic and practical training, providing students with continuous, contextual learning opportunities that prepare them effectively for the competitive job market. Discover how leveraging AI can fulfill the immediate needs of students while fostering innovation in educational design.

Would You, Could You, Try AI?" Bringing Faculty Onboard with AI

- Kristen Betts, Drexel University
- Michelle Miller, Northern Arizona University
- Julaine Fowlin, Medical University of South Carolina

"Would you, could you, try AI? Would you, could you in a class? In a lab? In a studio? Faculty integration of AI into courses across higher education is occurring at all levels from full integration to no integration. While some faculty have been at the forefront of AI others have been slower to adopt. This session explores factors associated with higher and lower levels of AI use. Building upon the protagonist in *Green Eggs and Ham*, this interactive sessions explores strategies to reach all faculty members through an AI integration continuum. This session will provide three approaches to increase AI awareness and support innovation through research from the learning sciences, professional development, and faculty collaboration. In addition, this session will engage participants in sharing strategies they are using at their institutions for integrating AI across disciplines from courses to labs to studios. Participants will leave with resources, tools, and creative strategies to transform hesitancy and reluctance into awareness and the potential discovery of benefits and an *unexpected* enthusiasm for AI.
